SFS Museum Background

The USAF Security Police Academy worked with the office of the Secretary of the Air Force (SAF) and Headquarters, Air Training Command (ATC) to establish the USAF Security Police Museum (later known as the USAF Security Forces Museum) at Lackland AFB, Texas on April 29, 1976.

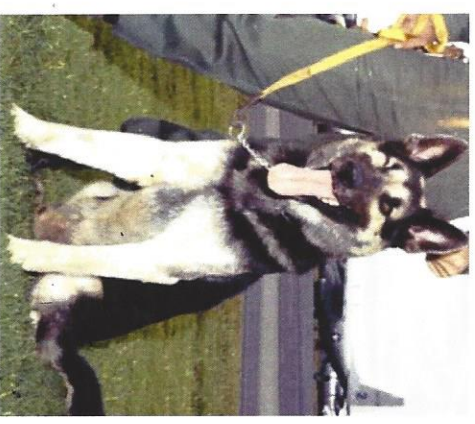


Security Police personnel who served during the Korean Conflict had started donating items worthy of preservation during the mid-1970's. Additionally, Security Police personnel also began acquiring a wealth of data and artifacts from the Vietnam War which they believed would be lost to history unless the items were immediately preserved.



The USAF Security Police Museum was established to be the focal point for the collection and preservation of items of historical value to the Security Police (now Security Forces) career field. Senior leadership believed that the new museum would help develop esprit de corps by providing new security policemen with a sense of history and professional pride. Initially, the new museum was established in a 3,000 square-foot area within the lobby of McGuire Hall which housed the USAF Security Police Academy. Resourceful Security Police personnel established the display area and new exhibits with an initial operating cost of just \$3,000. The Director of the Lackland AFB Museum provided the technical expertise to the new staff at the museum. The Security Police exhibits and displays were moved into the current facility upon its dedication on November 5, 1979.

The USAF Security Forces Museum provides exhibits portraying the history of the Security Forces career field. The mission consisted of: "providing a historical depiction of Security Police and Combat Arms Training and Maintenance (CATM) from inception to the present and depicting chronological developments and significant events occurring within the career fields by mean of exhibits, archival files and informational packages." The museum currently has exhibits and displays depicting numerous subjects including: the Security Police from the 1950's to present; Security Police training; the SFS Hall of Honor; the Military Working Dog Program; Emergency Service Team; the USAF Security Police Competitive Marksmanship-Defender Challenge; Allied Forces; and the Mounted Horse Patrol.
